

A QUESTION TO KEEP IN MIND


The Enlightenment period is often celebrated for its ideals of reason, progress, and universal human rights. But was this truly the unifying force of the early modern world?


Instead, consider this: could the true glue that bound humanity during this transformative era have been something far more pragmatic—commerce, catalysed by a shared belief in the value of money?

 - International engagement





- Francis Bacon (1561-1626) and Adam Smith (1723-1790)
- Massive improvements in living standards, but at what cost?


THE “GLORIOUS REVOLUTION”

- 1688 – William of Orange invited to replace James II on throne of Great Britain.
- Imported Banking and Financial innovation to England (B of E founded in 1694)
- Democracy and Representative Government.
- BUT unintended consequences in Scotland and Ireland.



EUROPEAN EXPANSION INTO AUSTRALASIA

- Mapping the Pacific
 - Captain James Cook's Voyages (1768 – 1779)
 - Scientific exploration
 - Preceded by Abel Tasman and Ferdinand Magellan
- Colonization & its impacts
 - Settlement of Australia
 - Disruption of Pacific Societies
 - Cultural exchange and conflict
- Integration into Global Trade Networks
 - Economic significance
 - Strategic importance
 - Migration and labour
